The Ministry of Tourism has long been aiming to reach the million tourists mark, and the Minister of Tourism said the Government will continue to promote Cambodia as a safe country to visit, 'We will continue to build tourists confidence and try to change their perception'.

2005 is set to be even better with Jan - April 2005 figures up 43% over the same period in 2004.

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## Mondolkiri set to take off...

The Hanuman staff recently experienced a Fam trip to **Mondolkiri**, and what we found was wonderful - another world, a windswept landscape of rolling hills, lush pine forests and shy minority peoples, very different to the rest of Cambodia. Improved road access means it is just six hours from the capital, **Phnom Penh**. Hanuman Tourism has several innovative itineraries that connect this emerging destination with **Kompong Cham** and **Kratie** in a loop, or links on to **Laos** for those planning a two-country holiday.

Later this year Hanuman Tourism is planning to open the first genuine eco-lodge in Cambodia in **Sen Monorom**, the provincial capital of Mondolkiri. Solar power, eco-friendly bathrooms and projects to assist disadvantaged minority communities in the area will set this apart from the competition. Known as the 'Mondolkiri Lodge', accommodation will be in sumptuously decorated bamboo clad chalet tents, complete with wooden floors and western bathrooms. The central bar and dining area will be styled in keeping with the local minority Phnong architecture.

Located about 1km from Sen Monorom on the new road to **Bou Sra** (Cambodia's most spectacular waterfall) Hanuman will offer exclusive packages to the lodge, including elephant rides, trekking and cycling to minority villages and 4WD adventures.

## QUALITY: No. 1 Priority

Here at Hanuman we strive to provide the best quality of service at all times to both our Agents and our clients. However, we fully acknowledge that occasionally we do not live up to our own very high standards.

We appreciate all the feedback we receive concerning problems and we fully investigate all complaints. Recently we completed a review of feedback/complaints and we are putting in place a range of measures to mitigate such events in the future. A large percentage of the complaints concerned guides, drivers and vehicles - all fundamental elements to the success and enjoyment of a holiday.

Hanuman has a limited number of its own guides, drivers and vehicles which we have full control over. However often, especially during the high season we have to use freelance guides and contract drivers/vehicles. Although all the guides we use are Ministry of Tourism approved guides we understand that as a developing tourism destination the quality of that 'approval' may not be as high as more developed tourism destinations - this can lead to the expectations of clients not being met

Hanuman has decided to tackle the guide, driver/vehicle quality issues head on and has introduced various new procedures to ensure all the freelance guides and

contracted drivers/vehicles we use will meet our own high standards. We have introduced 'Service Level Agreements' (SLAs) for both freelance guides and the vehicle/ driver rental companies. We are in the process of meeting with the guides and vehicle/driver companies explaining that they must agree and sign up to these SLAs if Hanuman are to contract them. We have also introduced a stringent auditing process to ensure that these SLAs are being honoured. Whilst we are meeting with the guides we are getting a better understanding of them, for example what their idea of an excellent quide is, and whether they have any specialist knowledge, such as birds, periods in history, rice farming etc. We can then better match a clients interests with a guides knowledge.

Based on our past experience of each guide, any complaints and compliments received about them, their guiding experience, language ability, specialist knowledge etc., we have introduced an enhanced payment system, helping us secure the better guides during the busy peak season months.

We feel the above measures will ensure that all the holiday makers we handle will have the best experience possible.

#### Attraction Price Increases... Angkor Wat

Confusion abounds... will they? won't they? A few weeks before the June 1st deadline, the company that owns the ticketing concession at Angkor Wat announced it was going to raise the price of all passes by USD 3. The tourism industry protested and come June 1st the price was not introduced, the company citing 'technical issues' as the reason. There has been no further news if or when the increase will be implemented.

#### **Choueng Ek (the Killing Fields)**

The Phnom Penh Municipality has controversially awarded the Choueng Ek management concession to a Japanese company. The Japanese company intends to develop the site enhancing the visitor experience. To pay for these developments on June 1st the entrance fee was raised from USD 0.50 to USD 2.

#### Sambor Prei Kuk

Until recently there was no entrance charge to visit the Sambor Prei Kuk temple complex, instead Hanuman used to make a voluntary contribution each time we took people there. However, a USD 3 entrance fee has now been introduced.

#### Cambodia Tourism Strategy?

The Government has asked the Australian Ambassador and the Asian Development Bank for assistance to establish a tourism strategy for the country and to protect and develop a dolphin habitat in Stung Treng province. A coherent, realistic, adequately funded development strategy for tourism in Cambodia is well over due. We await to see how involved the local tourism industry will be in its preparation.

#### Preah Vihear: Thai - Cambodian Border Strains

Age-old tensions once again flared up between Thailand and Cambodia in the middle of May. Cambodia's border council decided that the country should stick to its old border agreements of 1964 which were lodged with the United Nations. In the intervening years of conflict, Cambodia has lost considerable territory to neighbouring Thailand and Vietnam and this will be difficult to reclaim. The spat at Preah Vihear temple was most likely a little warning from Thailand not to push for the return of territory and they signalled their displeasure by constructing huts no more than 25m from Cambodia in no man's land. They also raised the Thai flag over a nearby mountain long considered Cambodian territory. Tensions eased as the month wore on and the border is now tentatively open for now. However, there is better news on the Cambodian side as road links continue to improve. Traditionally, most adventurous visitors starting out from Siem Reap approached the temple via the old Khmer Rouge stronghold of Anlong Veng. Now there is a faster route via the temple complexes of Beng

Mealea and Koh Ker. This route takes between five and six hours but should be faster by the start of peak season in November as more sections are being improved. The authorities are also concreting the steep final sections to the temple itself, guaranteeing year round access. This means it is now feasible to visit Preah Vihear, Koh Ker and Beng Mealea as a two-day, one-night trip on one of Hanuman's popular Temple Safaris. For those with an interest in more in-depth exploration at Koh Ker, this can be a three-day, two night trip.

## Koh Ker is Back on the Map!

The new toll road to the **Koh Ker** temples is now complete, making these incredible 10th century structures more accessible than ever before. In the dry season it can take as little as 2 hours to reach Koh Ker from Siem Reap and all of the temples have now been cleared of landmines. **Prasat Thom** is the showcase, a 45m-high pyramid with spectacular views across the countryside. Nearby Prasat Krahom is covered in jungle and highly atmospheric. Other important temples in the area include Prasat Ling with the best preserved in situ lingas in Cambodia and Prasat Bram, with several smothering trees cloaking the brick towers. All-in-all, a trip to Koh Ker is like a trip to the Angkor of old before it was discovered by mass tourism. We heartily recommend it for all adventurous tourists with a desire for discovery. #### Water Festival (Bun Om Tuk)

#### 14 - 21 November 2005

Experience the largest festival in the Cambodian calender - the annual Water Festival or 'Bun Om Tuk' in Khmer! The 3-day Water Festival in Phnom Penh is of great significance as it celebrates the end of the rainy season, the start of the fishing season, and also the unique natural phenomenon - the flow of the Tonle Sap river changing direction!

The Water Festival is truly a national event, many villagers throughout the country have spent almost a full year preparing

their villages boat – elaborately and brightly decorated dug out canoes with large eyes on the prows to ward off evil spirits. Thousand of Khmers descend on Phnom Penh over the three days to watch the races and cheer on their villages boat, which can be up to 20 meters long and contain up to 60 oarsmen, frantically paddling and chanting as the do battle in highly competitive races.

After an action packed 4 days in Phnom Penh guests will fly to Siem Reap where they will spend 4 days in much calmer, surroundings exploring the incredible Angkor Wat temples.

#### THE PEPY RIDE: PROTECT THE EARTH, PROTECT YOURSELF
